Lancaster and Preston.

The inhabitants of Lancaster were agreeably surprised on Saturday, by the announcement of the arrival on the river of a vessel, sent by the Ribble Company from Preston, laden with old coal, which was soon disposed off at the reduced price of 9½d. per hundredweight delivered in this town, being about 4½d. less than such coal had been usually sold here. Two other vessels arrived the same day in the river, with old coal, and both cargoes were sold at 10½d. and 11½d. per hundredweight. This is one advantage already obtained by the consolidation of the ports of Lancaster and Preston into one, to enable the Ribble Company to supply this neighbourhood with coal on low terms, and they intend to load their vessels here with freestone; and the Quay Company, we hear, have judiciously reduced their dues on the carriage of stone, by vessels which may have brought coal up the river, from 4d. to 1d. per ton.
